	construction of 450mm diameter under crossing, internal road, construction of					
	flag stage, construction of store with document room, electrical work, main					
	building upgrading and repairing of quarters. The sub project will be					
	implemented during the period from April 2020 to September 2020					
Land Acquisition	The proposed subproject does not involve land acquisition.					
Subproject	There are 09 GNDs and 09 ARPA divisions under the Mulankavil Agrarian					
Justification	Service Centre which comprise 4760-acre cultivable land for Paddy and high					
	land crop. 09 FOs and 10 WFOs also functioning in this area. ASC provides					
	valuable services to the farmers with available limited resources. Lack of					
	infrastructures, human resources and improper adaptation of modern					
	technologies are prime issue of the ASC. The space available in the existing					
	building was not adequate to provide a better service for the increased demand					
	of farmers at present. Office space for running various units of the service					
	providers of the government sector is not adequate. Sanitary facilities for both					
	the staff and the farmers are not in a satisfactory situation. Proper sanitary					
	facilities needed for farmers that's why repairing washroom and toilet will					
	helpful for farmers.					
	Storage facility for seed paddy and fertilizer also very limited. There is no					
	proper and spacious place with necessary equipment to conduct awareness					
	programmes for the farmers, hence conference facilities will be expanded and					
	upgraded. Internal roads/pathways within the ASC premises require					
	rehabilitation including construction staff quarter to cater to the increasing					
	number of staff, communities & farmers accessing the additional services					
	provided by the ACS.					

Therefore, provision of new facilities will support to establish the farm business school, communication and information center with ICT backup, farm machinery school and provide market support for farmers.

Gender Issues	Following is a description of the gender issues concerning the communities in
	the impact area of the ACS:
	• In the farming activities, both men and women are involved in this ASC
	division. However, women actively involved in land preparation, seeding,
	planting, weeding, preparation for marketing and they also involve in livestock
	management. In the farming activities, allocated payment of wages for female
	labour is less than the male labour.
	• In the Farmer Organizations (FO) males dominate decision making
	process and give less opportunity for female participants even though, women
	are included in executive committees of farm organization as vice president,
	vice secretary etc.
	• Women Farmer Organizations (WFO) also actively participates in each
	GN Divisions. However, WFOs have limited opportunities for agriculture
	related trainings, trainings on machinery and technology and mobilization
	programmes due to increasing responsibilities for women in their homes.
	Women farmers also faced difficulties for access the markets in proper time and
	they not have proper storage facilities.

They also do not have any safety measures to protect them from wild animals and any other dangers on route. Social Impacts	This subproject will benefit the local population of the area,

	The proposed activities will benefit farmers accessing services from
	the ASC. The ASC will have improved Sanitation facilities leading

	disturb ASC officers and visiting farmers. Land for materials storage
	and machinery parking near the site is available which may cause some
	disturbances to the nearby community. A labour camp may be
	established and there could be impacts from labour influx - however,
	will be very minimum considering that only limited number of labourers
	(approximately 5) may come from outside.
	There are no any sensitive areas (schools, preschools, hospitals,
	community centres, health centres) observed near to the construction
	site.

Mitigation Measures

- ✓ The social issues in any infrastructure developments project are common and cannot be avoided. Also, it is important to note that the majority of social issues are emerged and aggravated due to absence necessary precautionary measures taken by the contractor.
- ✓ For example, contractor will be required to do water sprinkling to minimize impacts from dust and carry out noise generating work during day time while ensuring noise pollution is kept to the minimum. Public access to the site to be prohibited or controlled via adequate fencing and signage in order to avoid risk to the public.
- ✓ The contractor will also be required to employ an environmental and social officer to address any issues that may crop up during project implementation. All contractors will be required to develop and implement a code of conduct for labourers, including procedures to establish and maintain a safe working environment. The staff and workers will be given an orientation on appropriate behaviours to ensure no disturbance to the community life and officers of the ASC. Adequate care and measures will be taken to avoid any violation of use of labour, accidents, or disputes with local communities and other risks associated with influx of non-local workers.
- ✓ Grievance redress mechanism will be established to allow ASC staff to raise any complaints and provide feedback regards construction activities.


