Nature of the land ownership for the subproject	Land of the existing ASC owned by the DAD. ASC has adequate and underutilized lands for the proposed construction. Therefore, the proposed civil work will not have any risks from having to obtain additional land. Therefore, the subproject activities can be implemented without causing any displacement or impact to people living adjacent to the ASC. Issues of resettlement will not arise.

Gender Issues	 Following is a description of the gender issues concerning the communities in the impact area of the ASCs: In the farming activities, both men and women are involved in this ASC division. However, women actively involved in land preparation, seeding, planting, weeding, preparation for marketing and they also involve in livestock management. In the farming activities, allocated payment of wages for female labour is less than the male labour. Women farmers face difficulties than male farmers such as getting market information, productive resources and services, technology, financial assets, rice varieties, post-harvest operations, water management and technical skills. In the Farmer Organizations (FO) males dominate decision making process and give less opportunity for female participants even though, women are included in executive committees of farm organization as vice president, vice secretary etc. Women Farmer Organizations (WFO) also actively participates in each GN Divisions. However, WFOs have limited opportunities for agriculture related trainings, trainings on machinery and technology and mobilization programmes due to increasing responsibilities for women in their homes. Women farmers also faced difficulties. Cultural and religious barriers also affect the women's participation in rural agriculture sectors and FO activities. (Ex. Hindu, Muslim widows are not willing to actively be involved in Farmer Organizations). Women headed families' additional problems in farming activities due to not having land ownership which restricts then from accessing water facilities and fertilizer subsidies. They are also affected by poverty, malnutrition, and mental stress.

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Social Capital - community-based organizations On-going Development Projects	 Women farmers are faced with more difficulties having to travel for a long time for long distances from their houses to paddy fields and walk through small pathway in the forest areas. They also do not have any safety measures to protect them from wild animals and any other dangers on route. Women are overlooked or unable to participate in extension training due the inappropriate scheduling. Active members of WFOs sometimes face difficulties in their family life due to the excessive time spend on meetings or training which leads to domestic violence Women who perform the role of head of household are often unable to access most services or, create market linkages to sell their produce. Patriarchal society not allows women to have high volume of assets which women unable to get huge amount of loans and invest in to agriculture activity or for high volume of agro-economy. 
