Specific objective and beneficiaries of the sub project:	For the ASC to function in the CSIA Project area as a sophisticated, modernized well-furnished and a resourceful one stop service center catering to present and future needs of farming community in order to increase their livelihood, income and agriculture productivity. It's expected that 2903 (Male: 1931 and Female: 992) farmers who engage in cultivating 15, 850 acres of paddy and high land in 24 villages directly benefit from this subproject. Staffs of the ASC, other departments, vendors and various
	service providers also could be considered as the beneficiaries of the subproject. Women from all committees namely FOs, WFOs and all women in the farming society will be benefited.
Sub Project Descriptions:	The proposed sub project is Repairs of Poonakary Agrarian Service Centre includes as following activities such as construction of toilet, construction of internal road, construction of store with document room, construction of water tank (2), guard room, construction of 450mm diameter under crossing, macadam road, construction of flag stage, construction of toilet for main building, extension to fertilizer store, repair to vehicle garage and painting to ASC.
	The sub project will be implemented during the period from April 2020 to September 2020
Land Acquisition	The proposed subproject does not involve land acquisition.
Subproject Justification	There are 10 GNDs and 11 ARPA divisions under the Poonakary Agrarian Service Centre which comprise 15850-acre cultivable land for Paddy and high land crop under the Poonakary ASC. 20 FOs and 15 WFOs also functioning in this area. ASC provides valuable services to the farmers with available limited resources. Lack of infrastructures, human resources and improper adaptation of modern technologies are prime issue of the ASC. The space available in the existing building was not adequate to provide better services for the increased demand of farmers at present. Office space for running various units of the service providers of the government sector is not adequate. Currently there no sanitary facilities for both the staff and the farmers which are not in a satisfactory level. Available furniture is very old and existing furniture's also not adequate. Storage facility for seed paddy and fertilizer also very limited. Internal roads/pathways within the ASC premises require rehabilitation including construction of designated vehicle parking areas to cater to the increasing number of staff, communities & farmers accessing the additional services provided by the ACS. Therefore, provision of new facilities will

support to establish the farm business school, communication and information center with ICT backup, farm machinery school and provide market support for farmers.

- In the farming activities, both men and women are involved in this ASC division. However, women actively involved in land preparation, seeding, planting, weeding, preparation for marketing and they also involve in livestock management. In the farming activities, allocated payment of wages for female labour is less than the male labour.
- In the Farmer Organizations (FO) males dominate decision making process and give less opportunity for female participants even though, women are included in executive committees of farm organization as vice president, vice secretary etc.
- Women Farmer Organizations (WFO) also actively participates in each GN Divisions. However, WFOs have limited opportunities for agriculture related trainings, trainings on machinery and technology and mobilization programmes due to increasing responsibilities for women in their homes. Women farmers also faced difficulties for access the markets in proper time and they not have proper storage facilities.
- Cultural and religious barriers also affect the women's participation in rural agriculture sectors and FO activities. (Ex. Hindu, Muslim widows are not willing to actively be involved in Farmer Organizations).
- Women headed families' additional problems in farming activities due to not having land ownership which restricts then from accessing water facilities and fertilizer subsidies. They are also affected by poverty, malnutrition, and mental stress.
- Women farmers are faced with more difficulties having to travel for a long time for long distances from their houses to paddy fields and walk through small pathway in the forest areas. They also do not have any safety measures to protect them from wild animals and any other dangers on route.

	 ASC will also serve as a place for ACS staff and community to interact, to share knowledge and create awareness about project. Therefore, the ACS will enhance community participation and relationships between ASC staff and farmers. The sub project will provide high-quality advisory services for farmers and agribusinesses in Poonagary and support the establishment of the farm machinery unit. The farm machinery unit will support farm machinery training, extension, business development and marketing facilities. Thus, will lead to increased technical knowledge of farmers in paddy cultivation. It's expected that 2903 farmers who engage in cultivating 15, 850 acres
	of paddy and high land in 24 villages directly benefit from this subproject. Staffs of the ASC, other departments, vendors and various service providers also could be considered as the beneficiaries of this subproject.
Negative Impacts	• During office hours noise and dust from the construction work will disturb ACS officers and visiting farmers. Land for materials storage and machinery parking near the site is available which may cause some disturbances to the nearby community. A labor camp may be established and there could be impacts from labor influx - however, will be very minimum considering that only limited number of labourers (approximately 5) may come from outside.
	 There are no any sensitive areas (schools, preschools, hospitals, community centers, health centers) observed near to the construction site.
Mitigation Measures	The social issues in any infrastructure developments project are common and cannot be avoided. Also, it is important to note that the majority of social issues are emerged and aggravated due to absence necessary precautionary measures taken by the contractor.
	For example, contractor will be required to do water sprinkling to minimize impacts from dust and carry out noise generating work during day time while ensuring noise pollution is kept to the minimum. Public access to the site to be prohibited or controlled via adequate fencing and signage in order to avoid risk to the public.

- The contractor will also be required to employ an environmental and social officer to address any issues that may crop up during project implementation. All contractors will be required to develop and implement a code of conduct for labourers, including procedures to establish and maintain a safe working environment. The staff and workers will be given an orientation on appropriate behaviours to ensure no disturbance to the community life and officers of the ASC. Adequate care and measures will be taken to avoid any violation of use of labour, accidents, or disputes with local communities and other risks associated with influx of non-local workers.
- ❖ Grievance redress mechanism will be established to allow ASC staff to raise any complaints and provide feedback regards construction activities.



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
