Nature of the sub project:	It's mainly new constructions in Puthukkudiyiruppu Agrarian Service Centre, Mullaitivu.
Size/ scale/ Cost of the Sub Project	10,000,000 LKR
Project implementing agency:	<p>Department of Agrarian Development, Mullaitivu which is the implementing agency. DAD with its network of officials based in the ASCs directly involves in implementing the subproject. Similarly, the staffs of the CSIAP based in national to divisional level will also involved in different stages of the implementation process appropriately. It is expected that all the service providing agencies such as Department of Agriculture, coconut development board etc. will also support to implement the subproject effectively from the community side, FOs, agriculture committee associated with the ASCs, WFOs will also contribute to implement the project. Similarly, the farmers in general will support to implement the project by tolerating the difficulties that would be created during the construction period.</p>
Specific objective and beneficiaries of the sub project:	For the ASC to function in the CSIA Project area as a sophisticated, modernized well-furnished and a resourceful one stop service center catering to present and future needs of farming community in order to increase their livelihood, income and agriculture productivity.

	Total number of beneficiaries is Male: 2,104 and Female: 1,498 who directly benefited from this sub project. All of them are war affected people. Also, women from all committees namely FOs, WFOs, and all women in the farming society also will benefit.
Sub Project Descriptions:	The proposed sub-project is Repairs of Puthukkudiyiruppu Agrarian Service Centre includes as following activities such as 1) Construction of Boundary Wall and Fence, 2) Construction of Sales Centre, 3) Construction of Wash Room and 4) Construction of Training Centre. The sub project will be implemented during the period from April 2020 to September 2020.
Land Acquisition	The proposed subproject does not involve land acquisition.
Subproject Justification	<p>There are 13 GNDs under the Puthukkudiyiruppu Agrarian Service Centre which comprise 4,430 acres total acres of paddy land (<i>extent of paddy land major: 255 acres, extent of paddy land minor: 375 acres and extent of paddy land rain fed: 3,800 acres</i>). 15 FOs and 20 WFOs also functioning in this area. ASC provides valuable services to the farmers with available limited resources. Lack of infrastructures, human resources and improper adaptation of modern technologies are prime issue of the ASC.</p> <p>Justification for each activity as bellow:</p> <p>1) Boundary Wall and Fence: ASC staffs do home gardening inside the ASC boundary. To protect vegetables and crops from livestock and also to ensure the safe and security of ASC it's necessary to construct boundary wall and fence.</p> <p>2) Sales Centre: At the presence farmers sell the vegetables through the subagents to the market which the prices are not reasonable. Farmers are not in a position to pricing the goods and also consumers pay much money to buy the vegetable. To overcome such issue proposed sales center will help to farmers pricing their products and also consumers also will be benefitted buy in less price as it's directly benefited to farmers (FO and WFO) and consumers more over ASC will gain income as rental (monthly rental amount not decided yet).</p> <p>3) Wash Room (Toilet): ASC has one toilet which used by ADO staffs (14) and farmers (40 to 50 farmers per day) which is insufficient to fulfill the needs. So, it's necessary to construct a washroom (toilet) for the ASC.</p> <p>4) Training Center: At the presence ASC doesn't have separate training center to deliver technical knowledge, awareness programmes to the farmers. They use to conduct meetings or trainings at conference hall. Therefore, ASC need to separate centre to conduct trainings and store the training materials as well.</p>

Gender Issues	Following is a description of the gender issues concerning the communities in the impact area of the ASC:					

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The gender norms and discrimination play key role in women labour which is not equal wages and not recognized. • Women farmers face difficulties than male farmers such as getting market information, productive resources and services, technology, financial assets, rice varieties, post-harvest operations, water management and, training and technical skills. • In the Farmer Organizations (FO) males dominate decision making process and give less opportunity for female participants even though, women are included in executive committees of farm organization as vice president, vice secretary etc. • Women Farmer Organizations (WFO) also actively participates in each GN Divisions. However, WFOs have limited opportunities for agriculture related trainings, trainings on machinery and technology and mobilization programmes due to increasing responsibilities for women in their homes. Women Farmers also faced difficulties for access the markets in proper time and they not have proper storage facilities. • Cultural and religious barriers also affect the women’s participation in rural agriculture sectors and FO activities. (Ex. Hindu, Muslim widows are not willing to actively be involved in Farmer Organizations). • Women headed families’ additional problems in farming activities due to not having land ownership which restricts then from accessing water facilities and fertilizer subsidies. They are also affected by poverty, malnutrition, and mental stress. • Women farmers are faced with more difficulties having to travel for a long time for long distances from their houses to paddy fields and walk through small pathway in the forest areas. They also do not have any safety measures to protect them from wild animals and any other dangers on route. • Active members of WFOs sometimes face difficulties in their family life due to the excessive time spend on meetings or training. In some cases, the staffs (possibly male staff like GN, DO, ADO, etc or even NGO staffs) frequently contact these active members to organise or schedule meetings and programmes which creates a suspicious mind set to the husband that leads to domestic violence. • Women are overlooked or unable to participate in extension training due the inappropriate scheduling. • Women who perform the role of head of household are often unable to access most services or, create market linkages to sell their produce. • Patriarchal society not allows women to have high volume of assets which women unable to get huge amount of loans and invest in to agriculture activity or for high volume of agro-economy.

Public access to the site to be prohibited or controlled via adequate fencing and signage in order to avoid risk to the public. • The contractor will also be required to employ an environmental and social officer to address any issues that may crop up during project implementation. All contractors will be required to develop and implement a code of conduct for labourers, including procedures to establish and maintain a safe working environment. The staff and workers will be given an orientation on appropriate behaviours to ensure no disturbance to the community life and officers of the ASC. Adequate care and measures will be taken to avoid any violation of use of labour, accidents, or disputes with local communities and other risks associated with influx of non-local workers. • Through the relevant officials the FOs will request the contractor for employing local labour to the maximum extent possible and hire village vehicles for material transport. Any individual requests for service by the contractor will be conveyed to the authorities and will be attended to without compromising the project activities and social and environmental concerns. • Grievance redress mechanism will be established to allow ASC staff to raise any complaints and provide feedback regards construction activities.


